

Together, let's think about ...
*Hearing Loss & How
We Can Help*

The allergy season of 2002 was a difficult one for me. Not only was I sneezing and coughing, but I was having trouble hearing. I thought maybe my ears were stopped up along with everything else. So I made an appointment with an Ear, Nose and Throat specialist.

It turned out that while I did have significant allergies that could be helped by immunotherapy, the problem with my hearing had nothing to do with my allergies. My doctor referred me to an audiologist. After a complete test of my hearing, we discovered that I had what was characterized as moderate-to-severe congenital hearing loss. The good news was that my problem could be greatly improved by wearing hearing aids.

At the time I was a single mother to two elementary-aged sons. I didn't have a lot of extra money in my budget. While the hearing test was covered by my insurance, the hearing aids were not. I simply could not afford to pay the cost of hearing aids out of pocket. And so I continued to suffer from my hearing loss for another decade.

In 2013, I was hired by the General Board of Discipleship. When it came time to choose a family insurance plan, I discovered that the GBOD plan offered something that the State of Tennessee plan did not: a significant annual benefit for hearing aids. We went with the GBOD plan so that I could finally

get the hearing aids I had needed for more than ten years.

Hearing aids have greatly improved the quality of my life. I wear my hearing aids all the time. They are the first thing I put on in the morning and the last thing I take off at night. I only wish that I had not had to wait so long to get them.

Our goal is to collect hearing aids that are no longer being used, have them cleaned and reprogrammed, and distribute them to persons who can make good use of them.

Because of my own experience, I have developed a great passion for advocating for people with hearing loss. I feel that hearing aids should be covered by insurance; that hearing loss should not be stigmatized; and that being able to hear should not be considered optional when it comes to overall health and wellness.

Last year I got a new pair of hearing aids. But my old pair was still in great shape. I was simply upgrading. I began to wonder what happened to hearing aids that were no longer needed by a person. For example, when a loved one dies and leaves behind a great pair of hearing aids, what does the family do with them? These are instruments that cost anywhere between \$2000 and

\$5000! This is not just a matter of waste. It is a matter of *good stewardship*! Surely, used hearing aids could be reprogrammed and given to people who simply did not have the resources to pay for them. I raised the question with the Parish Health Ministry team, and the idea of creating a way to collect, reprogram and redistribute gently used hearing aids was born.

The Church Street Hearing Aid Repurposing Project (HARP) operates under the umbrella of the Parish Health Ministry. Our goal is to collect hearing aids that are no longer being used, have them cleaned and reprogrammed, and distribute them to persons who can make good use of them.

If you have a pair of hearing aids in your possession that are no longer being used, please consider donating them to HARP. Your donation is tax-deductible. To donate, simply put the hearing aids and any accessories that might be with them in a box or a bag and drop them off at the church office. Let the office staff know they are a donation for HARP, and are to be directed to me, Rev. Dawn Chesser. If you are unable to drop them off, please contact me so I can arrange to have them picked up. Parish Health News

Is it Safe to Take an Expired Medication?

Most health care professionals will advise you not to do so since this is the safest response. However, I suspect many of us have done it. This information is provided to help you make the best decision when faced with the same situation again.

The two main concerns with using expired medications are:

1. Loss of potency
2. The drug may become toxic as it degrades.

Loss of potency results in decreased effectiveness. Solid dosage forms (tablets/capsules) tend to be more stable than liquids. Liquids reconstituted from a powder and requiring refrigeration are least stable. These are typically children's antibiotics, which would leave an infection under treated if used past the expiration date. It is also unwise to use an expired medication for what could be a life-threatening condition. Examples of this include Epi-Pen for anaphylactic allergic reactions and nitroglycerin tablets for chest pain. However, using the expired medication is certainly better than no treatment!

The one report of a medication becoming toxic as it degrades dates back to 1963. This was a case of kidney damage that may have been caused from taking expired

tetracycline (an antibiotic). Since then tetracycline has been reformulated and no similar problems have been reported.

Consideration should also be given as to whether the medication contains preservatives. This is usually true for eye drops and injectables. A loss of effectiveness for the preservative could result in diminished protection from bacterial contamination.

You may be surprised to learn that the manufacturer is not required to determine actual length of potency. It is left up to them to select a desired date for testing. For example, if they choose a 2 year expiration date, they do not have to test it beyond that date. The FDA requires that a drug maintain 90-110% of original potency, as indicated on the label, under proper storage conditions at the expiration date.

Most literature on the issue quotes a study initiated by the FDA many years ago at the military's request which resulted in the Shelf Life Extension Program for the Department of Defense. Replacing expired drugs in their emergency stockpiles is a significant expense to the government.

This study found that 88% of the lots tested for 122 medications should have

their expiration date extended by more than a year. (Extensions averaged 5.5 years to maximum of 23 years.) It should be noted that the drugs were stored in their original packaging and according to the manufacturers' recommendations.

Once a drug is removed from the original packaging, the manufacturer's date can no longer be relied on according to regulations. When the pharmacy removes a prescribed amount to dispense in another container, an expiration date of one year from the dispensing date may be applied or the date on the original bottle if shorter than a year.

General guidelines are that you should not take an expired product:

- for any drug that must be monitored by checking a blood level
- that is injected
- that has not been stored properly
- that looks old (crumbly, powdery, or dried up creams/ointments) or has a strong smell (especially true for aspirin).
