A. Orin Bishop Lecture Series

Please mark your calendars for two major events in the A. Orin Bishop Lecture Series this fall.

On Saturday and Sunday, October 19 &

20, Dr. Gerald Borchert will return to Church Street for a study about the book of Revelation. Dr. Borchert has taught at many schools throughout the world and has been the dean of





two American theological seminaries. A translator for the New Living Translation, he has penned over 200 articles and about 30 books including commentaries on John, Galatians, Thessalonians and Revelation as well as works on worship, evangelism, counseling and guides to visiting the Bible Lands—having taught and been in the Mediterranean world more than 50 times. Among his most recent works are *Portraits of Jesus for an Age of Biblical Illiteracy* (Smyth & Helwys) and *Jesus: Background. Witnesses and Significance* (Mercer U. Press). Times for this series: October 19 at 9:00 am and 10:30 am, and on October 20 at 9:45 am and 2:30 pm in Parish Hall.

On **Sunday, November 10**, Pulitzer Prize winning journalist Jennifer Berry Hawes will join us for a three-part series about her new book *Grace Will Lead Us Home*, her narrative of the tragedy and aftermath of the 2015 Mother Emanuel Church shooting in Charleston, South Carolina that took nine lives. Sessions will be held at 9:40 am, 1 pm, and 3 pm. More information will be shared later this month, but please mark your calendars for these special events, made possible by the generous legacy gift in memory of A. Orin Bishop.

September is National Hunger Month

Food insecurity and the childhood hunger epidemic are global issues, and the U.S. and communities here in Knoxville are not immune. Lack of access to nutritionally-rich foods can carry long-term impact. Children who experience hunger are at risk of impaired brain development and motor skills, and they often struggle in school as a result. Here are some additional stats to remember, from Feeding America and Unilever, as we acknowledge and support efforts related to National Hunger Month this September:

13 million



Together, let's think about ... Hunger

Have you ever been hungry? Truly hungry? The kind of hunger that isn't satiated with a large dinner, but one that eats at you and makes it hard to focus?

Most of us have not. We have a limited understanding of hunger because we can easily go to the pantry or store and find something to eat.

However, for more than 42 million people in the United States who live in food insecure households, that is not an option. According to Feeding America, one in eight Americans struggle with hunger. For the 11 million children who face hunger in the United States, school lunches might be the only meal they have each day. Jesus reminds us in the Lukan Beatitudes, "Blessed are you who are hungry now, for you will be satisfied" (Luke 6:21a, NRSV). But how will their hunger be satisfied?

According to Feeding America, one in eight Americans struggle with hunger.

At Church Street, we aim to meet physical hunger in multiple ways. Through the Soup Kitchen, we serve between 150 and 230 trays of food each Thursday. Once a month, volunteers, led by Beth Stubbs, pack bags for Food 4 Kids, in relationship with Second Harvest. These bags are filled with snacks that

go home with children from South Knoxville Elementary and West View Elementary on the weekends.

The Beacon of Hope Food Co-op was able to provide about 10,000 meals to 76 individuals in 20 households in 2018. Most of the members of this Food Co-op also rely upon food pantries to subsidize their monthly food stamps.

September is National Hunger Awareness Month. On Sunday, September 29, we will be collecting food items for Beacon of Hope's Food Co-op. Please be on the lookout in next week's Messenger and Announcement Insert for what is needed. Let's satisfy the hunger of our neighbors.
