CLERGY CONNECTION

Together, Let's Think About... *Jeremiah*

This past Wednesday at the noon service I preached about Jeremiah. The passage was from near the end of the book. After 31 chapters of the prophet warning the people that unless they confessed their sinfulness and repented of their evil ways, Jerusalem was going down. The armies of Babylon were closing in. The city was under siege. The enemy was literally at the gate, and the people were desperate. They had lost all hope.

Jeremiah himself was confined to the palace, where the King, Zedekiah had locked him up for prophesying that Judah was going to fall to Babylon. So there he was, in jail. And the word of the Lord came to him and told him that his cousin, Hanamel, was going

to come to him and offer to sell him a piece of land in the nearby town of Anathoth. This land was family land. It had been in the hands of Jeremiah's kinfolk for generations. The Lord told Jeremiah when Hanamel came to him, he should buy the land. And so he did.

At this dire moment, at the height of Judah's desperation and hopelessness, from his jail cell, Jeremiah buys a piece of land in Anathoth, outside of Jerusalem. Jerusalem, which was under siege. Why in the world would Jeremiah do such a crazy thing? Especially when he knew he was about to get hauled off into captivity. At first glance we might say it's because God told him to buy the land. But it's more than that. Jeremiah invested because he trusted God and had hope in the future, even though things at the moment were uncertain.

We are entering into the season of Stewardship at Church Street. Right now, things may seem uncertain in the church and in the wider denomination. We have had some struggles and discord in the past year. People may be asking whether they want to continue to invest when the future direction of our church seems unclear.

But the truth is, no matter what is going on—whether we are in a time of peace and satisfaction, or the enemies are at the gate—we invest in the future because we know our congregation is held in the hands of a loving and faithful God. I hope as you prepare to make your pledge you will revisit the book of Jeremiah, especially its final chapters, and act in faith, trusting that God is leading this church forward as God always has.

In Conversation Together

Lend your voice, your thoughts, and your feelings to the important task of healing and building Church Street together this fall.

The Work:

Scope: Dr. Craig Gilliam of Gilliam and Associates will spend time with a liaison group of lay leaders and clergy to gain background information and do pre-work, before convening facilitated opportunities for our entire congregation to be heard, in helpful and healing conversation with one another about:

- Who we are
- Where we are
- Where we need/want to go and be as God's church

Proposed Timeline: This Fall & Winter

- **Step One:** G&A to work with CSUMC leadership to prepare materials, outreach and background
- **Step Two:** Opportunities for congregational conversations and feedback with G&A
- **Step Three:** G&A makes a report to share with CSUMC
- **Step Four:** CSUMC reviews report and makes plans for next steps

About Dr. Craig Gilliam and Gilliam & Associates (G&A):

Dr. W. Craig Gilliam has worked as a coach, educator, trainer, organizational consultant, and facilitator for 20+ years.

Dr. Gilliam is affiliated with the UMC and has been on staff for The McFarland Institute, a training and service counseling/therapy center in New Orleans; Just-Peace (UMC) Center for Mediation and Conflict Transformation in Washington, D.C.; The Center for Pastoral/Leadership Excellence in the Louisiana Conference, UMC; adjunct instructor at SMU, and a senior conflict transformation/resolution specialist for Arbing Institute. www.GilliamAndAssociates.com.

What will they be asking us?

In carefully facilitated conversations and small groups, church members will have space and time to share the strengths, concerns, and challenges before us. One-on-one conversations and written feedback may also be solicited by the facilitators in instances where a member may not be able to or want to share in a group setting.

Why now?

The UMC is in the midst of enormous transformation and change, and Church Street is as well. We must tend to all of the factors that influence our church body, as there is not a singular issue that is challenging us right now. And we need to do that ahead of General Conference 2020 to prepare for the denominational, conference, and church changes that may come.

What are we expecting from this? Didn't we just conduct a survey?

The informal electronic survey taken over the summer garnered about 200 responses, and it was a step in this important work of learning where we are as a body. This survey showed us that church members LOVE this church, and it showed us a need to engage more deeply with one another to address and act on our strengths as a church, as well as our challenges, so that we can begin to develop and carry out a shared vision for the future. To be able to articulate our vision as a church body for our community, we need to work internally first, and to do that, we need some help having honest conversations about the work we have to do together.

Who is leading this work?

Our clergy, lay leaders, and staff are working in partnership to bring Dr. Gilliam to CSUMC to execute this work. As a clergy and lay leadership *team*, we feel the time is right, ahead of the decisions to be made at GC 2020. We want this work to ensure our church is on firm footing and prepared for how the denomination, and Church Street, may need to address change.

How do I participate?

Stay tuned for information about meeting places and times in the coming weeks and months. We hope to begin in *late October or November*, so that we may have data to utilize and guide us before the end of the year.

We ask that when you come to these conversations, you do so with your honesty, your love for Church Street, and a desire to be in partnership to make this a better place for all who enter and worship here. Please *pray* for this work's fruitfulness.

I'm tired. Do I have to participate?

No. You don't. But we want you to have a safe and welcoming space to express your thoughts and feelings about the complexities of being part of such a diverse and large church body — *especially* if it means sharing the fatigue, pain, or discomfort you may be feeling. Having an objective and trained facilitator, who is intimately familiar with the goings-on of the UMC, should instill trust among us and hopefully will give us the renewed energy we need to practice healing and honestly conversing about the future of our beloved church.
