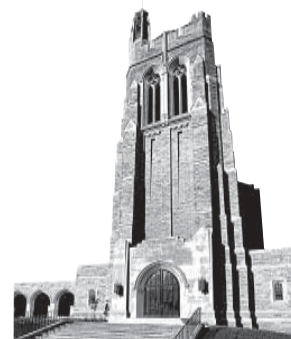

Confirmation weekend culminates 9 month experience

This coming Confirmation weekend, which includes a Saturday evening banquet and the Confirmation service on Sunday morning, celebrates the end of the 2010-2011 Confirmation Class. The class of twenty-two 6th graders has met during Sunday School beginning in mid-August of last year through April of this year.

In addition to the regular class activities exploring many aspects of the Christian faith and Christian discipleship, the students and parents have participated in a wide variety of opportunities including: assisting in 3 missional/outreach organizations (Society of St. Andrew, Second Harvest Food Bank and Heifer Project International.); visiting Lake Junaluska on a weekend winter retreat; and worshiping with 4 other congregations in the city (Temple Beth-El, Immaculate Conception Catholic, St. John's Episcopal and Lennon-Seney UMC).

In the past month each confirmand has met with one of the clergy staff to talk about his/her decision to be baptized and/or confirmed. Class members will also help lead the Easter sunrise service on April 24.

We celebrate with these students as they profess Jesus Christ as their Lord and Savior and join The United Methodist Church and the faith community at Church Street. Holy Week at Church Street!

• Stations of the Cross

Stations of the Cross, reproductions of great works of art, will be placed throughout the Chapel during Holy Week, symbolizing the path Jesus walked during his final days on earth. Scripture and prayers for private meditation and reflection accompany each station. [Chapel...9 am to 7 pm...Sunday-Thursday, April 17-21] Note: On Palm Sunday, a guided service of word and singing will be held in the Chapel at 6 pm surrounded by the Stations of the Cross.

• Footwashing Service

On the night before his crucifixion, Jesus washed the disciples' feet. We are bringing this ancient tradition of the church to our Holy Week as a response to Jesus' new commandment that we love one another as he has loved us.

• Labyrinth - Thursday

Church Street's Labyrinth will be available for prayer walks and Holy Week reflection on Maundy Thursday. Note: Walks must be completed by 6:45 pm.

After the meditation and the serving of Holy Communion, we follow Christ into the Garden of Gethsemane through scripture and music.

The dramatic service ends in darkness as the altar and chancel are stripped and the cross is draped in black, symbolic of Christ's death.

This ecumenical observance, sponsored by 7 downtown churches, begins at the center of Market Square will move past the 7 stations around the Mall and Krutch Park. • Good Friday Tenebrae Service

The Service of Tenebrae, also called the Service of Shadows (darkness), is an extended meditation on the passion of Christ. Next rotation of **Four Course Fellowship** begins in May...Signup this Sunday!

The next 4-month rotation of **Four Course Fellowship**, Church Street's "Dinner Club" opportunity, begins in May. Groups are established and locations, appetizers, salads, entrees and desserts rotate within the group on a monthly basis.

• **Here's how it works:** You sign up (with a spouse, relative or friend) and are placed in an 8-person group to share a meal and fellowship. Your group gets together once a month (for four months). The days and times of the meals are determined by your group to be convenient for all eight persons.

The host pair provides meat, beverage and home; the second pair provides appetizer and vegetable; the third pair provides salad and bread; and the fourth pair provides dessert. Each month a different 2-person team in your group becomes the host pair, and all pairs rotate the portion of the meal for which they are responsible.

Reflections...

This past week, Rev. Terry Jones, pastor at that the Dove World Outreach Center in Florida, moved ahead with his threat to burn a Koran. His message was that Islam is “of the Devil” (according to the title of his book).

His action was based the idea that he is free to express himself and his outrage over the many terrorist threats that challenge our American way of life. That Muslims have been connected with many of the high-profile terrorist threats is easily confirmed. But, we cannot equate Islam and terrorism any more than we can equate every German with the Holocaust. The fact is that people and movements of all kinds have been using tactics that can be described as terrorism. That Muslims have some kind of monopoly on terrorism is nonsense.

What Rev. Jones fails to appreciate is that his actions have consequences. In this case his actions have had lethal consequences for good people who are serving this nation or the United Nations. His response, when told of the riots that led to the deaths of several people in Afghanistan, was that the terrorists were responsible (and thus he was not). He cannot sidestep his responsibility so easily.

The world has changed. We are not isolated any longer into nations or concerns that stand apart from one another. According to the story I saw, the people of Afghanistan learned of the Koran burning when Rev. Jones reported it on his own website. It appears that he tested them to see if they would react. It is no surprise to anyone that they responded with riots on the streets and damage to U.S. – Afghan relations.

The day when we can focus on our own experience and opinions while ignoring all else is past. The world has been compressed, and it will not go back to its former isolation. We must attend to the implications of our actions, and this becomes a factor in our decision-making. We must look beyond our personal focus to see who else might be affected by actions we are considering. We have louder voices than we realize.

As I write this, this point seems to go beyond the Biblical examples we know. In most cases, the characters of the bible were isolated, just as Israel was isolated. The world is different from the Biblical world or even the world of 50 years ago; we must conduct ourselves differently, too.
