

Volunteers needed to help Change the World on May 14

Church Street adults and youth are invited to participate in this year's *Change the World* Service Day on **Saturday**, **May 14**. *Change the World* is a global movement of United Methodists doing what they can to improve lives in their own communities.

Three service projects have been organized for our congregation including (1) an in-house project at **Church Street UMC** which includes cleaning the Nave, painting a hallway, etc. (2) cleaning, organizing, and painting at **Wesley House**; and (3) replacing a roof with **Knoxville Leadership Foundation**.

Note: The Church Street and Wesley House projects will require just the morning. The roofing project will include Friday and will be dependent on weather. Volunteers need to contact the church office at 524-3048 and choose in which project they wish to participate.

Volunteers will meet at the church on Saturday, May 14, in Parish Hall at 8:30 am for instructions. Work will end by noon.

UMW General Meeting will feature Haiti Water Project Tuesday, May 10 · 11 am · Parish Hall

The May UMW (United Methodist Women) general meeting will feature Church Streeter, Diane Richards, who will give an update on the Haiti water project.

Diane and her husband Harlan just returned from Haiti where they installed a second water filtration system at a Catholic elementary school in the Bouchan Carre community. The 1,500 students, as well as their teachers and families, now have access to clean water. Note: The proceeds from the 2009 UMW Bazaar went toward the installation of the first filtration system in a Bouchan Carre hospital.

Joining Diane for the presentation will be Sonya Mire, a member of Knoxville's

Sacred Heart Cathedral and its Haiti Outreach Project (HOP) board. She will share the overall picture of what HOP has been doing regarding education and healthcare issues and projects in Haiti.

Reflections...on the recent world news

On Sunday night, the word was going around; on Monday, the story was on every news program: Osama bin Laden has been found and then killed. In Pakistan.

Many questions remain: What does this mean for the war in Afghanistan? What does this mean for U.S. relations with Pakistan? Will U.S. embassies and citizens be targeted for revenge attacks soon or eventually?

I am struck at the immediate sense of relief. According to the news, people gathered outside the White House to celebrate the news almost immediately. This has been the longest war in U.S. history, one which has been focused on this one man. Of course, it was never that simple, and yet Osama bin Laden, the mastermind of the World Trade Center attacks of 9/11 was the face of the war on terrorism. Still, with his death, the focus on bin Laden has been resolved. The war on terror will not be resolved for a long, long time.

Further, what does this victory do for the hope of peace around the world? More than sixty years ago, the death of the mastermind of the Third Reich, Adolph Hitler, meant the end of hostilities and the world moving on to rebuilding. In this environment, we will not likely see an early change. Terrorism has too many faces. Civil unrest in the Islamic world of the Middle East has its own reasons. How does this nation continue an alliance with Pakistan after finding him so close to that country's West Point?

The world is complicated, and that complicated quality is not going to resolve itself any time soon. So, as Christians, how do we work for peace in a complicated world? There was a time when making peace meant resolving conflicts with someone who shared our Christian faith; that simple day has passed. We will live in a multi-cultural, multi-faith world from this time forward.

What does peace look like now? Peace is no longer merely the end of hostilities; it is not the day when the soldiers are sent home to tend the farm. Peace is also jobs and opportunities for people. Peace is an environment marked by justice and freedom for all people. Peace is political and social involvement.

As Christians, we offer to the world the One, Jesus Christ, who promises peace to all peoples. As Christians, we practice the ways that make for peace in neighborhoods, in communities and in nations. As Christians, we must not retreat into pious isolation. Our Jesus holds the key to peace and healing in the world. We must do the hard work of thinking through the current issues and the eternal truth.

Now that Osama bin Laden is dead, the world still needs Americans to lead in the world and Christians to do the work of God in the world.

Confirmation Class makes a difference in the world



This past year the Confirmation Class participated in service projects that have made a difference in the world. The class members chose 3 projects that help persons in our local area,

region and the global community. Over the course of the 2010-2011 confirmation year, our 6th grade students collected:

- 185 lbs of food items for Knoxville's Second Harvest Food Bank;
- \$150.71 for *Heifer Project International* which will go toward buying a goat for a third world family.
- \$123.53 for the *Society of St. Andrew* which gleans fields and feeds the hungry for about 2.3 cents per person, per serving. This amount will provide over 6,000 servings of fresh fruits and vegetables to individuals.
