Stained Glass Windows of Church Street

The third week of this series on the stained glass windows will focus on the "Sower and the Reaper." The window was given in memory of Dr. Harcourt A. Morgan, the 13th President of the University of Tennessee and churchman. Like the previous window, this one begins with two parables of Jesus and then provides a sermon. For Dr. Morgan, the sermon was his life-long passion: The Common Mooring Concept.

Born August 31, 1867, in Ontario, Canada, Dr. Morgan earned his B.S. degree from the Ontario Agricultural College in 1889 and later did graduate work at Cornell University. After graduation Morgan moved south to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, to become professor of entomology and horticulture at LSU. Any reservations southerners may have held about this "foreigner" in their midst were put to rest soon enough when he tackled the farm evils of cattle tick and boll weevil.

Morgan stressed man's duty to protect the land, to save the environment for future generations, and to realize the interrelationship and unity possible amid the diversity found in

humankind and in nature. This concept of "oneness of the universe" became known as Morgan's "common mooring" philosophy, which was to help man "understand his place, feel his responsibilities, and know his importance in the eternal plan." If one part of nature were overemphasized, an unnatural imbalance would occur, thus creating the possibility of disaster. (Source: http://web.utk.edu/~mklein/morgan. htm).

Reflections on World Communion

World Communion Sunday, October 7, was conceived as a response to World War II. This was the second great war which pitted Christian nations against each other. This fact led to a crisis in faith for Christians in Europe and America. In response, World Communion Sunday was begun with the conviction that the one great source of unity and humanity in the world is Jesus Christ. On this Sunday, the peoples of the nations which were caught up in WW-II will meet at the communion table.

As history moves forward, the tensions between the old warring parties of WW-II have faded. The present tension is between nations identified with Islam and Christianity. So, World Communion Sunday, which invites the world to the Lord's Table on

this day, takes on new meaning. We call the world to take notice of this World Communion Sunday.

- Do we invite people of every nation and creed to faith in Christ? I think we do. The call to carry the Gospel of Jesus Christ into all nations remains not with force and coercion but with the compelling Good News of God.
- Does the Christian faith call us to live in peace with our neighbors including those of different creeds? I think it does. Christianity was born into a time of many religions; we are in such a time again.

So, as we come to the communion table this Sunday, be aware that we are making a powerful claim to a world-wide audience. As always, the Christian faith is not a place to hide from the world.


some treats. The money raised from this fundraiser will help pay for their trip to Philadelphia at the end of the school year.
