Book of Tributes



Reflections

Ash Wednesday began a day early for me. I went out to supper looking for pancakes – the traditional Shrove Tuesday meal. Our destination was IHOP; "pancakes" are in the name, after all.

When we arrived at IHOP, the place was a madhouse. There were cars in every parking place; I had to maneuver to find a place to park. When I got to the restaurant, the people were lined up outside; the entry area was packed. Further inside the walkway was crowded with people waiting, servers carrying trays; every table was full. The hostess said the wait would be 45 minutes.

I saw our familiar server. "This place is crazy!" She could only agree.

Back outside, I met the friends who were meeting me for supper. They had come the year before; back then the place was empty on this evening. What could account for the change? Looking around, we saw a poster in a window: "Free pancakes on Shrove Tuesday." Their promotion was clearly working.

We asked a couple of young people just arriving, "Why have you come to IHOP tonight?" the answer was simple: "Free pancakes." "No other reason?" The young woman shrugged, "No, just free pancakes."

How sad! Shrove Tuesday prepares for one of the high holy days of the year – Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. No matter, free pancakes were all she knew.

Then, on Wednesday, I joined the congregation at the Ash Wednesday Service at the church. As Pastor Darryll marked my forehead with ashes, I found myself deeply moved. At the marking, I knew exactly what I was doing there. He marked the sign of the cross, and as he did, he intoned the ancient words, "Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return." I realized that my life is mortal. Death will come one day, and nothing stands between us and that end except the cross.

Thus, we observe Ash Wednesday. Except for the cross and the resurrection of Jesus Christ, there is nothing beyond this life, and the value of this life becomes questionable. Because of the cross, eternity stands beyond this life, and the value of this life is assured by Christ's victory. It was a strangely moving moment.

By the end of the day, the cross marked on my forehead had been reduced to a smudge. No one at Kroger even stopped me with a question about it. I was disappointed. Nevertheless, I am not disappointed about the cross. Because of Jesus, the cross points the way. It is God's promise of eternity.
